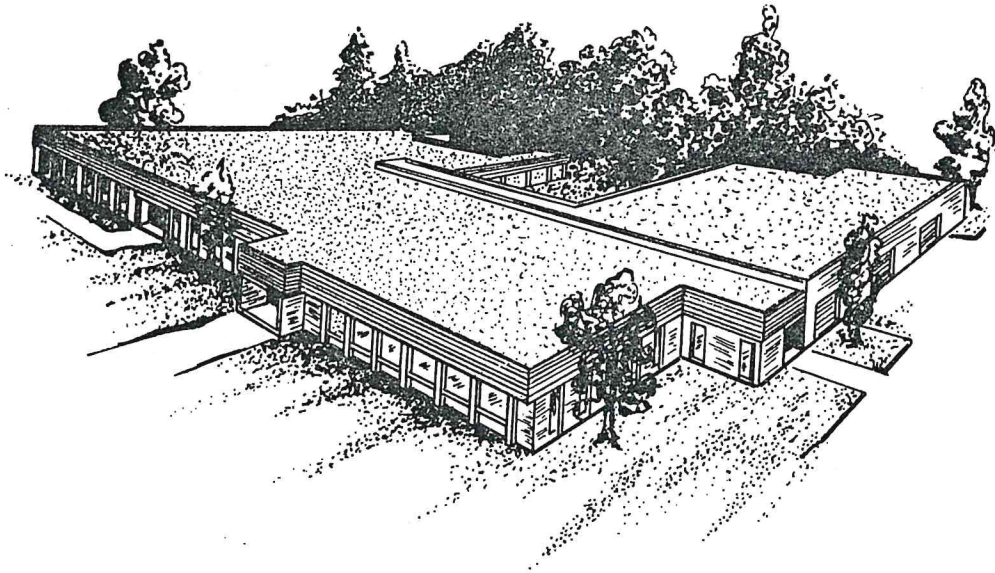

MOHAWK COLLEGE.....Saltfleet Campus

1970.....

Early in 1970 it was said in a newspaper article, that "It would be unlikely that the Ontario Manpower Retraining Program would have a new building when Mohawk College took it over in September, 1970, but would lease their present quarters from the Board of Education for the City of Hamilton."

But, here we are at Saltfleet, and have been since December, 1970.

We have no actual anniversary date because we all arrived in bits and pieces from three different directions. The English As A Second Language Department, under the leadership of Mrs. Kay Ryckman, were the pioneers. They came from the old Queen Victoria School, Hunter Street, Hamilton, on December 4, 1970. The office staff from both Dundurn and Hunter Streets, took up residence in their no carpet; no paint on walls; no doors on vital services, no telephones, no nothing vacant space, on Monday, December 7, and started to open the mountain of cartons stacked around the room.

On December 14, the Basic Training Department led by the hands of Roger Mann and Peter Durie, arrived in force. Then the Commercial Department, one week later, ably steered and directed by Mrs. Gladys Jones.

Now the Campus was almost complete except for a few incidentals like paint on the walls, the odd door and strip of carpet. Our Resource Centre remained empty until well into the New Year, when it became one of the busiest places on campus.

Early in 1971, our Technical and Trades Department arrived from their quarters in Central High School. They couldn't come before because the machinery and other vital odds and ends had not arrived at Saltfleet.

The meals in the Cafetorium improved daily, and we were soon able to get a hot dinner as well as a large variety of salads and good home-made soup.

Christmas, 1970, and New Year, 1971, came and went without much fan-fare or decoration - mainly because we couldn't find the boxes of ornaments and things. Also, we were all too exhausted by the move to be very merry. There was however, the usual concert of Christmas music in the Cafetorium with the organ played by Richard Smith, excellently as usual.

Just as the office staff breathed a sigh of relief and all the cartons had been cleared and disposed of by Andy, our cheerful and helpful maintenance man, it was decided that the office and faculty office, would go "Mod". Our "out-of-date" handy brown wood desks with drawers all over the place and somewhere to put your purse and your feet, were designated to the storage area and replaced by spanking new arborite top tables with chrome legs and two dinky little drawers that held nothing of any consequence. There was a separate typing table that ran all over the place until it was discovered that there was a brake on the wheels.

Then, along came a counter, and lots of filing cabinets and the Faculty Office changed into areas of cave dwellers divided by course designation and surrounded by tall cupboards, round tables, and bright blue room dividers.

Everyone settled down after that and lo and behold, along came Open House and the Official Opening of Saltfleet Campus on March 17 and 20, 1971. This involved a tremendous effort by faculty and students, not to mention staff, and when it was over everyone was proud to belong to such a modern and progressive campus.

There is not much point in enlarging on the events of the next month, just to say that we lost many friends and had varying degrees of anxious moments because of the cutbacks that the college was forced to make at that time.

1970....

The new campus is finished except for incidentals like painting walls and laying some carpet.

December 4, 1970 English As A Second Language moved from Hunter Street.

December 7, 1970 Administrative offices moved from Dundurn.
Some machine shop equipment from Wentworth.

December 8, 1970 Set up Administrative office and the Bookstore.

December 11, 1970 Basic Training moved from Dundurn.

December 12, 1970 Set up Basic Training.

December 18, 1970 Commercial moved from Dundurn.

December 19, 1970 Commercial classes set up.

Then there was a heavy snow storm, and everyone had trouble getting their cars out of the unpaved, very muddy, parking lot.

Lawrence M. Ogden appointed Co-ordinator of Retraining Programs, Saltfleet.

William Ross was appointed Assistant Head of Commercial.

Irene Kish appointed Resource Centre Supervisor.

Dean Knowles appointed Admissions Officer.

1971....

Official opening of Saltfleet Campus, Tuesday, March 16, 1971.

The modern, 106,000 square foot retraining centre, was officially opened by Lorne M. Johnston, Assistant Deputy Minister of Education.

The Saltfleet Campus was constructed for Mohawk College in 1970 by Ball Brothers, Limited, of Kitchener, on a lease-back arrangement. Operation of Saltfleet Campus is under the direction of Program Director, James Weber, Continuing Education Division. Lawrence M. Ogden is co-ordinator of the campus.

Approximately 500 guests attended the opening ceremony which was by invitation only.

On Sunday, March 21, 1971 the first "OPEN HOUSE" was held to which the public was invited.

Various lunch-time concerts arranged for the students by the Student Council under the direction of Henry Brink and Tom McAlexander. Well received by both students and staff. So far we've had rock bands and a very enjoyable pianist.
